

INVITATION Symposium Servant-Leadership Across Disciplines

Monday 2 May 2011, 12.30-18.00 p.m. Auditorium, Main Building, first floor Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam

Now, more than ever, a leader's capacity to both direct the organization and its people, while at the same time work in their service, is being recognized as a vital capacity for creating a sustainable organization. Servant-leadership is a leadership principle embedded in a way of life, which has been recognized and expounded upon in all parts of the world from ancient times on, and across all cultures. The recent economic crisis again reminds us of its importance as an antidote to the selfish and bonus-oriented behaviours we have witnessed and the economic/societal consequences we have seen.

At its simplest, servant-leadership is driven by the motivation of *enabling others* work more effectively and be successful. Servant-leadership thus means leading a group or organisation in the service of people, be they clients, customers, employees, partners, colleagues and/or members of your network. Integrating both head and heart, servant-leadership does not stop there. It expands as a principle to serve the community and act a steward of the environment and all that inhabit it. Culturally speaking there are different ways of realizing this aspiration.

As the 21st century progresses it is clear that leaders in all areas of society are faced with increasingly complex challenges. At the personal, professional and societal level, leadership requires listening to the needs of the other to bridge different meanings and visions and create interdisciplinary solutions which are beneficial to all. What are the talents and challenges of those, working and leading in other fields and academic disciplines? Listening to other disciplines even in the close proximity of the VU community; where are one's own assumptions about leadership challenged? What have we learned so far in conducting interdisciplinary research on servant-leadership internationally and at the VU? How can VU students and scholars across the disciplines build on each other's creative ideas and talents to deepen each others insights and enrich the VU identity?

The symposium *Servant-Leadership across Disciplines* aims to explore some of these questions, comparing cases of servant-leadership practices across disciplines at home and worldwide. Using a cross-cultural approach we wish to serve the learning needs of future generations in developing servant-leaders for the corporate (non-corporate) world. For the symposium at the VU on 2 May 2011, we are delighted that we have found VU experts from different disciplines willing to present their insights about challenges of living, teaching and researching servant-leadership. For SLCRE, it is a next step from passion to action.
